UPDATE ON AGO CHORAL FESTIVAL!

Definitely mark your calendars to attend the AGO CHORAL FESTIVAL on Sunday, Feb. 11 at 7:00pm at the First Baptist Church on Fairmount Blvd. Bring your choir members and friends. Hosted by Dr. Robert Schneider, this promises to be a memorable event. Five excellent choirs from the area will be performing two anthems each. They include:

ALLELUIA CORNER

"Amen" - a Hebrew word from the root 'mn' which means "to be Trustworthy." (Groves)

Who would have thought that when we sang "Amen" at the end of our hymns, we were actually singing "to be trustworthy."?! In most of the current hymnals, the final "Amen" has been eliminated, and some of the contemporary songs used in our various services simply repeat (over and over) the final phrase instead. As an organist, I always rather liked the use of Amen as I found it interesting to play around the cadence making the ending more fitting for reflection or sheer joy on the verses we just sang.

Some singers and parishioners tell me they still miss the hymn Amens, once a historical liturgical acclamation in response to or a "seal" upon a Doxology or prayer. In the Bible, 'Amen' is mentioned 78 times, i.e. as when Christ's assertions are introduced with the word "Amen."

In the early Christian church, "Amen" was an acclamation chanted unceasingly in the heavenly liturgy, a symbol of Christ as the sure rectifier of God's word. It was also used at the end of the Gloria as well as of the Credo in the Mass. Interestingly the word "Amen" has usually been left untranslated into other languages; it has become a universal word used as an act of faith.

During the Reformation, Martin Luther added Amens to other liturgical chants. In the polyphonic Masses of the 17th and 18th centuries, the dynamic character of the Amen led to the writing of extensive finales in fugal style. So important was 'Amen' in religious rites, that over the centuries, composers developed the Amen Chorus where the word is repeated over and over again. This practice, begun in the 1600's with Bertali, continues through the music of Mozart, Bach, Beethoven, (in Parsifal), Mendelssohn and even in various contemporary anthems. In Cherubini's D minor Mass, at the end of Credo, the soprano section alone repeats the word 107 times.

In Europe the settings of 'Amen', IV-V ending, also called the 'Amen Cadence', was appended to various 19th century Hymnals. It was always a reminder that the scripture or words expressed were 'Trustworthy' – a word meaning honest, faithful, upright and dependable. It is a statement of power, a word much needed in this period of chaos, crime and deception. Maybe it's time to bring it back into our current musical vocabulary.

At the moment I am recruiting students for our Master of Sacred Music program at the University of Notre Dame.! This program is in its second year, and it is a wonderful program that has already attracted nine really fine students.! We are extremely excited about what is going on here. The assistantships pay full tuition for two years plus a stipend of \$10,000 per year for two years.! Typically a student on an assistantship works in the Basilica of the Sacred Heart on campus.! This broadcast will change soon to another network.! There is so much musical work to be done there that it is a great hands-on learning experience.!

* glissando: a technique adopted by string

players for difficult runs.

* **risoluto:** indicates to orchestras that they are to stubbornly maintain the correct tempo no matter what the conductor tries to do.

* senza sordino: a term used to remind the player that he forgot to put his mute on a few measures back.

* **crescendo:** a reminder to the performer that he

has been playing too loudly.

* **conductor:** a musician who is adept at following many people at the same time.

* clef: something to jump from before the viola

solo.

* **transposition:** the act of moving the relative pitch of a piece of music that is too low for the basses to a point where it is too high for the sopranos.

* **vibrato:** used by singers to hide the fact that

they are on the wrong pitch.

half step: the pace used by a cellist when

carrying his instrument.

* **coloratura soprano:** a singer who has great trouble finding the proper note, but who has a wild time hunting for it.

* **bar line:** a gathering of people, usually among

which may be found a musician or two.

- * beat: what music students do to each other with their instruments. The down beat is performed on top of the head, while the up beat is struck under the chin.
- * **cadence:** when everybody hopes you're going to stop, but you don't.

* diatonic: low-calorie Schweppes.

* **opera:** when a guy gets stabbed in the back and instead of bleeding, he sings.
