ABOUT K.LEE SCOTT

K. (Keaton) Lee Scott is an internationally known teacher, musician, conductor and composer of sacred music, choral music and hymns. He has published over 300 compositions, including anthems, hymns, works for solo voice, organ, brass and major works, and his hymns are published in eight hymnals. Scott holds two degrees in choral music from the U. of Alabama School of Music, where he studied under Frederik Prentice. He has served on the music faculty of the University of Alabama School of Music and Samford University School of Music. He has appeared as guest conductor and clinician throughout the U.S. and in Canada and Africa.

ALLELUIA CORNER

"We do not think that Congregational Singing will ever prevail with power until Pastors of Churches appreciate its importance and universally labor to secure it...A minister should study the contents of the Hymnal as he does those of the Bible if he is to employ hymns as means of his people's fellowship with God." -- Ethel & Hugh Porter (Union Seminary, N.Y.)

Of all the essentials in Christian worship, hymns are among its oldest and most enduring elements. As first mentioned in Genesis 4:23-24, songs of worship appeared about 150 B.C. in the Hymn to Apollo, Exodus 15:1-21. The term hymn, of Roman heritage, was derived from the Anglo-Saxon word, Hymen, the god of festivity and the music sung at the marriage feasts. The early Christian church also used old Hebrew melodies, usually adding the Gloria Patri (Doxology) at the end as a sign of the cross. In today's services, the Doxology usually follows the Offertory, a centuries old custom regally still in existence.

The early Christians met regularly to sing their songs of faith, long before there were sacred scriptures, formal creeds, fixed liturgies, or churches. The earliest description of their worship was contained in a 2nd-century letter from Pliny the Younger to the Roman Emperor, Trajan, and recounts how Christians "were in the habit of meeting on a certain day before dawn, when they sang in alternate verses a hymn to Christ, as to a god." Through the later inclusion of Psalms as its word basis, the rise of the Old Roman chant and the Gregorian chant (7th-12th A.D.) were a stunning, mystical form of music that eventually led to chants and hymns being sung in the common language now known as "sung speech." Later the dynamic and inspiring German Chorale was introduced in 1524 by Martin Luther, later magnified by the musical genius of Bach, Brahms and composers of the 16 – 19th c.

'Contemporary' folk tunes, i.e. the beautiful Passion Chorale (first sung by the women of the streets), were added to the mix by virtue of the beauty and strength of the music rather than from where it came. Our "Star Spangled Banner" is based on an old drinking song, yet, when done professionally, is still wonderful to hear. Just ask the soldiers coming home from wartorn countries such as Iraq.

It was Luther alone who broke the centuries-old chain barring congregational response in the worship service, a courageous, definitive historical step that forms the basis of our worship in music today.

He also wrote 37 hymns; his EIN FESTE BURG has been translated into over 200 languages and during the fearful persecutions of the Huguenots in the 16th century, many died "joyfully as martyrs with this hymn upon their lips." As Martin Luther stated: "I am not ashamed to confess publicly that next to theology there is no art which is the equal of music, for she alone, after theology, can do what otherwise only theology can accomplish, namely quiet and cheer up the soul of man, which is clear evidence that the devil, the originator of depressing worries and troubled thoughts, flees from the voice of music just has he flees from the words of theology....I truly desire that all Christians would love and regard as worthy the lovely gift of music, which is a precious, worthy and costly treasure given mankind by God... Next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in this world."

Lately, when substituting at a church, I noticed in the Sunday bulletin that the tune names (i.e. EIN FESTE BURG) of the hymns being sung that day were omitted (as so ordered). Early on I had learned that hymns do not have titles, but that they have names. This ancient and interesting custom was very handy in times before hymn books were even thought of or printed. The tune to be sung was announced by its name to the congregation, and became a familiar garment of sound dressing the words of chants, poems and scriptures used in the services. In today's hymnals, the tune name of the hymn appears in capital letters (or in italics), and a hymn tune could be set to several different texts when the poetry and time signatures agreed. I think that every hymn sung should have its name included in the bulletin as part of its historic identity.

As the Porters affirmed, it is important that a minister of music inspire the congregational members to sing and prevail with power in their fellowship with God. But even more, as Luther said, you have in your hands the noble art of music, truly the 'greatest treasure in this world.'
