IMPRESSIONS OF THE 2008 NATIONAL AGO CONVENTION IN MINNEAPOLIS

Wow! What a week at the convention! We heard stunning organ concerts, uplifting worship services, attended fascinating workshops, spent too much at the exhibits, and enjoyed being with our colleagues from around the nation and the world!

Cleveland AGO members spotted at the convention include Tim Robson, Bob Moncrief, Fern Jennings, Todd Wilson, John McElliott, Nicole Keller, Peg and Will Limkemann, Karel Paukert, Chris Holtkamp, John Russell, Ed and Hildred Tornberg, Ruth Brintnall, Carmen Massaro and Carol Neff.

On Saturday evening, we attended a pre-convention concert hosted by Frederick Hohman with the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra. Fred played a variety of pieces, and the highlight was the congregational hymnsing using Fred's arrangements for organ and orchestra. We learned that Fred's pen name is Carlos Xavier Santiago.

The local churches prepared splendid worship services for us Sunday morning with special music. I attended the services at Westminster Presbyterian Church which began with a string ensemble playing Mozart....a great way to begin the day!

The opening Celebration Sunday evening began with a prelude by the 2006 NYACOP winner, Scott Montgomery...an exciting performer! The music of Stephen Paulus, AGO Composer of the Year, was featured throughout the convention, and the first hymn, "When in our Music God is Glorified" was his thrilling arrangement. The choirs of the downtown churches combined to present a variety of anthems along with the Minnesota Boychoir. The sermon was presented by Dr. Martin Marty on the of "The Sounds in an Creation....worship should convey a sense of awe, and that worship requires celebration. The program concluded with a stunning improvisation by Tom Trenney that combined two of the hymns from the service. Bravo, Tom!

Throughout the week, we heard a variety of wonderful organ concerts at various churches

throughout the area. We were thrilled with the concert given by the St. Paul's Cathedral Choir from London (men and boys) in the Cathedral of St. Paul.....just beautiful!

Tuesday morning we were at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church for two concerts. Michael Barone introduced the program by saying that no one performer can capture all of the world of organ music. John Weaver then gave an excellent concert that concluded with his own composition on "Kingsfold." He received a standing ovation. Next we heard Cameron Carpenter. Mr. Weaver introduced Mr. Carpenter as one of his former students at Julliard, saying that he has a brilliant musical mind and compared his genius to Mozart. Mr. Carpenter gave a dazzling performance of music including Chopin, Sowerby and Bach and concluded with his own composition entitled "Nautical Rondo." playing extremely energetic.....fast His was footwork, multiple piston changes and fascinating....I've never seen anyone attack organ playing with so much energy! You can watch a video of Mr. Cameron on YouTube.

The evening program on Tuesday was a Gala Concert at Orchestra Hall featuring the music of Olivier Messiaen. The program was presented by especially fine pianists with a soprano, violin, or clarinet, and ended with an ensemble that played six keyboard instruments called Ondes Martenot. A Messian film was then shown called "Apparition of the Eternal Church" which Tim Robson found fascinating.

Wednesday began with Choral Matins led by St. Paul's Cathedral Choir. Workshops and concerts followed including a magnificent concert by Todd Wilson on a stunning Sipe, IV/78 1979 organ, concluding with Reubke's "Sonata on the 94th Psalm." Bravo, Todd!

The Annual meeting was led by out-going AGO president Fred Swann, who admitted he was a "convention junkie." Mr. Swann was honored for his many years of service to the AGO, including a hymn we all sang written describing his life to the tune of St. Anne. Very fun! James Thomashower, Executive AGO Director, suggested we check the

web for other organizations of organists that are not part of the AGO, including one group called "Praise Teams that Annoy God." The door prize was free registration for the 2010 national AGO convention. No one from Cleveland won.

On Wednesday evening, we were the audience for "A Celebration of the Pipe Organ in the 21st Century with Pipedreams host Michael Barone." Mr. Barone assembled a marvelous program of virtuoso performers from around the world. Mr. Barone interviewed each performer, and the concert was recorded. It will be played on his Pipedreams programs in October. An exciting evening!

Our final convention day began with a Carillonneur concert, followed by two organ concerts, exhibits and workshops in the afternoon, and then a fabulous closing concert at the gorgeous Cathedral of Saint Paul in St. Paul. A stunning building! The first half of the concert included anthems and organ solos presented by four choirs in the front with a stunning Skinner organ in the balcony. The second part was a glorious presentation of "Te Deum" (2005) by Siegfried Matthus....twelve movements of exquisite music with the huge choir, soloists, full orchestra and organ, conducted by Philip Brunelle, who somehow managed to keep everyone together. At the end of the concert, when we were ready to applaud, Mr. Brunelle cut off the music, but held his baton up....the bells from the church tower began to peal for at least five minutes, with the choir singing bursts of "Amen"....a goose-bumpy end of the evening!!! We then walked a block to the Minnesota History Center for a gala reception.

Overall, this was a terrific convention! The Hilton Hotel was perfect; the workshops were engaging; the bus service ran smoothly; the artists were amazing; worship services were inspiring; the program book was easy to use; the restaurants were efficient and served great food; the exhibits were varied and friendly; the overall organization was superb; and we all had a great time! Plan to go to the next Region V convention in Detroit on June 28-July 1, 2009; and the next national AGO convention in Washington, D.C. on July 4-8, 2010. You'll be glad you could go!

AMERICAN GUILD OF ORGANISTS' INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE ORGAN 2008-2009

The AGO's year long festival celebrating the musical instrument we all love got off to a great start in Have you made plans to take part? Minneapolis. That's right—you take part! The International Year of the Organ (IYO) is a pride festival to increase the public's awareness of the king of instruments. Why is it important for each chapter member to do It could help bring the organ at something? Severance Hall back to use. It could increase attendance at various church recital series enough to insure they continue. It might even help preserve your job as the organist at your church, especially if you are competing with a band or members of your church are thinking about bringing in a band.

If you have not made plans to take part, now is the time to start planning. The AGO has some very helpful documents on their website to give you ideas. The best document is the Concert Programming guide for the Organ Spectacular on October 19. This is the day that National has designated to blanket the country with events promoting the organ as an exciting musical instrument. National has even commissioned three works for use on Organ Spectacular Sunday, and at other events we might plan as part of IYO. The Cleveland Chapter has a committee planning an afternoon of activities at St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights. Details on this will follow. However, for this to be a year of the organ we need more events than those on this day. Here are two things that I will be doing at my church.

First, on October 12, I will play a special prelude that will call attention to IYO and the Cleveland Chapter event the next Sunday. I will be doing this at both services—even the contemporary service that is led by a rock band. I will utilize the contemporary services' projection system and have a slide show displayed during the music showing pipe organs built since the year 2000 with captions pointing out the instrument is indeed alive and not on its way to dinosaur status. I have already contacted a number of organ builders asking for pictures and they are being most helpful.

The Powerpoint slide show is necessary at the contemporary service and will be appreciated by the traditional liturgical service as well. I am doing this because of the guide lines from the guild. IYO programs should not be about us performing pieces we think people should hear and in a style we think they need to learn to appreciate. IYO is about analyzing an audience that knows nothing about the organ and presenting the instrument to them in a way to which they will respond to positively. I have also decided that I will not be playing a major concert work.

The prelude music will be Robert Hobby's prelude on Engelberg (1) which is often matched to the text, "When in our music God is glorified." The piece has a delightful, modern, rhythmic fanfare motif in the beginning and ending sections that will complement the energy level of the contemporary service. The ending, with a grand cantus firmus in the pedal, will also prompt an "awesome" response from at least one youth. During communion at these services I will be playing Michael Burkhardt's trio on Nettleton (2). This delightful piece evokes images of an Appalachian folk ensemble and requires performance techniques similar to the Bach trios. When the band returns from communion, they will then lead singing of "Come, Thou Fount" in a true folk style. My goal is simply to show that the organ can be an effective and meaningful instrument in worship and maybe even complement other instruments.

My second project will be a Mother's Day concert for residents of the Lutheran Home in Westlake and their family members. This will be a follow-up to a recital I performed there in June to benefit Prince of Peace's African missionaries. It was on the Friday night of Father's Day weekend. During the concert, we learned the home had a family dinner gathering that evening in honor of Father's day, but the concert was not advertised to the families. We already arranged for a cooperative event in the spring. In the weeks that follow, if only one family member of a resident tells even one friend of a positive experience with the organ, then the event will satisfy the IYO goals.

My June concert this year proves that the IYO guidelines work. I planned the program around the audience wanted Ι to attend—the whole congregation, not just the traditional service attendees. The missionary fund raising helped make it a congregational event from the start. I also found musicians from both the contemporary traditional service groups to perform with me and advertised that the program would contain a variety of musical styles so there would be something for everyone. The June concert was the first organ recital at Prince of Peace since the organ installation I talked with some folks from the in 1987. contemporary service about the recital and found that I now have people who will help promote future organ events.

This is what IYO is all about—increasing awareness and developing support for our instrument. Its something we can all do, even if in a small way. Be sure to check the Organ Spectacular Programming Guide for ideas to help you participate (www.agohq.org). We just have to be persistent about it.
