ESTONIAN PHILHARMONIC CHAMBER CHOIR TALLINN CHAMBER ORCHESTRA

On Friday, November 14 at 7:30 p.m., our Cleveland chapter, in collaboration with Greg Heislman and the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, presents the Estonian Philharmonic Chamber Choir and the Tallinn Chamber Orchestra. This professional choir tours regularly in Europe, the United States, Canada, and Japan, and, in 2007, won the Grammy award for Best Choral Performance. Eight times previously, they have been Grammy nominees. The ensemble is composed of 28 singers whose repertoire ranges from Gregorian Chants to late Baroque and 20th century music.

The choir's partnership with the Tallinn Chamber Orchestra has been long and fruitful. These two groups have made several tours together, both in Europe and in the United States, focusing on and recording works by composer Arvo Part.

Their concert here in Cleveland will include compositions by Arvo Part, Erkki-Sven Tuur, and Antonio Vivaldi.

Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist is at the corner of East 9th St. and Superior Avenue, downtown Cleveland, and free parking is available in the Cathedral Garage, one block north of the Cathedral at East 9th St. and Rockwell Avenue.

ALLELUIA CORNER

"All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above; then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all his love." Mathias Claudias

The quotation above speaks of the bounty God sends us as we spread the seed on the ground. Like magic, it is fed, watered, and, imbued with the power of the sun, and eventually becomes our food. It is a time of preparation, appreciation and gratitude for our bounty along with family and friends. Ah, as a child I remember it well when we prayed around the dinner table and tucked our napkins in our clothes as the food was distributed. We didn't dare to talk with a mouth full of food, and tried to eat strange offerings with civil manners, sometimes using our napkins to hide our dislikes. Even after getting married, we continued that ritual, especially during family times and even after our kids left home, as I'm sure many of you do. It's a good feeling. Somehow, most of the food tastes and digests better. At Thanksgiving, our feast is the celebration of the Pilgrims' courage at that first Thanksgiving festivity when they shared their meager feast with invited Indian tribes who also brought food. Thus the following story caught my eye as to why such traditions are still a special occasion.

This account was shared by an elderly gentleman who told of his most "memorable Thanksgiving dinner." He was 12 years old at the time when his and the parents of the two boys he hung around with were suddenly called way by an emergency on Thanksgiving Day. So it was arranged that the three boys would try their hands at cooking a small turkey and making their own meal. He recalled "What made it memorable was that we were on our own, free of sisters, fathers and mothers, and able to dispense with such things as napkins, silverware, manners and all civilized restraint"

After the meal was cooked, "We heaped mounds of mashed potatoes on our plates, took all the gravy the plates would hold, eliminated sissified slices and just cut the turkey in chunks. If someone reached across the table and clawed off a choice piece, nobody sent him from the table. We just laughed and yelled and kept on eating."

"About halfway through the meal, we all got quiet. Nobody finished his mountainous serving. We cleaned up the dishes without any enthusiasm and wandered off in all directions, not saying a word."

"Actually," he reflected, "we all had an early lesson—that joy and lack of restraint are not synonymous. We realized that there is something to be said for a woman's ways, for good manners, and that there is real value in etiquette, formality and civil behavior. From that day on," he said, "whenever he let his appetite momentarily run away with himself, he practically glowed with pleasure as his mother would lean across a corner of the table, rap me a good one behind the ear with her knuckle and say sternly, "Robert, you're at the table!!"

Although this story may have no outward meaning to us a musicians, its charm lies in our everyday behavior and manners when working with staffs, (people, that is), congregations, choristers and those who struggle with our 'ways' or when we struggle with 'their' ways. I remember one of my choir tenors complaining loudly (to all) whenever we sang an anthem in Latin even though he stuck with it. Many years later, he hinted to me that he learned to 'like' Latin in spite of it all. Lately, when he was celebrating an anniversary, I sent him greetings, half of it in Latin.

Horst Buchholz began his current position as Canon for Music and Worship at Trinity Cathedral on September 14, 2008. He was raised in Germany, but has lived in the U.S. since 1989 and considers this country to be his home. He studied at the Berlin College of Church Music, the Hochschule der Kunste Berlin and the Berlin Conservatory of Arts and received his doctor of music degree from

Indiana University. Prior to his arrival in Cleveland, Dr. Buchholz served as Director of Music and organist of Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Denver, music director and conductor of the Denver Philharmonic, and associate professor of church music at St. John Vianney Seminary in Denver.

Jonathan William Moyer maintains a dynamic career as organist, pianist and conductor. Last month, he began his position as the organist and music director of The Church of the Covenant, Presbyterian, Cleveland. He is a doctoral candidate in organ as a student of Donald Sutherland at the Peabody Conservatory of Music, where he completed both a graduate performance diploma in organ and a master's degree in piano as a student of Ann Schein. He has participated in several European organ festivals and coached with a number of international artists.

In September of this year, Mr. Moyer received the second prize in the Sixth International Musashino Organ Competition in Tokyo, Japan, and, in 2005, he was one of four finalists in the St. Albans International Organ Competition. He has served as sub-dean for the Baltimore Chapter of the AGO and served on the steering committee for the critically acclaimed 2007 AGO Region III Convention in Baltimore. Throughout 2008, he is performing the complete organ works of Olivier Messiaen in four recitals at the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in Baltimore, MD, celebrating the centenary of the composer's birth and the renovation of the cathedral's organ.

<u>Timothy Robson Celebrates 25 Years at Euclid Avenue Church</u>

On Sunday, November 2, 2008, at 3:00 PM, organist Timothy Robson will present a recital marking his twenty-five years of service to Euclid Avenue Congregational Church of the United Church of Christ, Euclid Avenue at East 96th Street in Cleveland (near the Cleveland Clinic). The November 2nd program celebrates three other important musical anniversaries: the 100th birthdays of French organist-composer, Olivier Messiaen, and the German church music composer, Hugo Distler, and the 50th anniversary of the death of the great English composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams. The program also includes works by Johann Sebastian Bach. There is no admission charge. Free parking is available in the lot just east of the church building, entered via East 100th Street. There will be a reception in Tim's honor following the concert.

Timothy Robson has served as Director of Music and Organist at Euclid Avenue Congregational Church since November 1983. He holds degrees from Drake University and Case Western Reserve University. His principal teachers included Carl Staplin, Larry Smith and Arthur Poister. He has performed widely in northeast Ohio and elsewhere, and for more than twenty years he has partnered with Toronto Symphony English hornist Cary Ebli in duo recitals of music for English horn and organ. From 1993-1997, Robson was the Music Director of the North Coast Men's Chorus in Cleveland.

The final round is held concurrent with the Regional Conventions. Required repertoire is published with the official rules in THE AMERICAN ORGANIST.

Prizes: Chapter level varies. Regional: First place - \$1,000; Second - \$500. Additional information may be requested from National Headquarters by email, fax, mail or telephone.
