AGO CHORAL FESTIVAL MARCH 22ND

The concert of Mozart Masterpieces conducted by Robert Porco and accompanied by organist, Timothy Robson is at 7:30pm at The Federated Church in Chagrin Falls. You are invited to come for the rehearsal from 2:00-6:00 p.m and the light supper (\$5) at the church but if you plan to do so, you must register with Ginny Roedig, <u>Roedig5@msn.com</u> or 440.257.3281 so that we have enough food. W.A. Mozart: "Laudate Dominum" from the Vesperae Solennes de Confessore, K.V. 339

At the time of writing his two *Vesperae*, Mozart was in a very difficult relationship with his employer, Hieronymus Graf Colloredo, Archbishop of Salzburg. Not only did Colloredo restrict Mozart in his travels, he also made extensive restrictions on the composition of liturgical music. In spite of everything, Mozart did manage to write two *Vesperae* in the two years before finally leaving Salzburg to seek his fortune in Vienna.

The Vesper is originally the penultimate religious service of the Catholic Church. Originally an independent musical form consisting of five pieces based on specific psalms, Mozart broke with tradition by writing six parts based on the text of the same psalms in the same order.

The Laudate Dominum takes its text from Psalm 117. It concludes with the words many of us know as the Gloria Patri. Originally written for violins and continuo, the piece can be seen as having two parts. After an extensive introduction, the dominant seventh prepares the way for the soprano entrance in F-Major. The second text verse of the Psalm is highlighted through the use of a secondary dominant leading temporarily to the key of C-major. The movement eventually returns to F-major where it stays to introduce the choir into the second part of the piece using the text of the Gloria Patri. Towards the end of the piece, Mozart surprises us with a deceptive cadence into the relative key of D-minor where the soprano soloist reenters singing a melisma over the choral amen. The voices gradually return to the key of F-major and the piece closes with a perfect authentic cadence.

This work is short and stunning in its simplicity; an outstanding example of Mozart's brilliant gifts.

HOW TO PRACTICE SINGING CHORAL MASTERPIECES

(including the Mozart Coronation Mass)

If you want additional practice singing the Mozart Mass before March 21st and 22nd, go to *Cyberbass.com*. Click on *Major Works*. Scroll to *Mozart Coronation Mass* and click. The screen will show the movements and vocal parts. Click on the appropriate one (e.g, if you are an alto and are having trouble with the 1st movement, click on Kyrie, Alto Part and you will hear your part played with the accompaniment.) Of course, this experience can't replace actual singing with a chorus, but it is an excellent way to learn or review parts in major works.

ALLELUIA CORNER

"Alleluias sereins d'une ame qui desire le ciel" (We beseech Thee, Almighty God. that we may in mind dwell in Heaven.) from <u>L'Ascension</u>, pour Orgue by Olivier Messiaen

While studying piano and then organ, I was fed the usual musical diet of Bach, Mendelssohn, and ended up working with Bill Tinker, brilliant beyond his years, who threw everything at my fingers and said "learn!" My tears were for naught and so I began. Dick quietly shut his office door and the kids grew fond of the outdoors year around, while I danced into the worlds of Langlais, Durufle, Alain and finally jumped into the bottomless ocean of Messiaen. I then began to wonder if the musical world had truly gone mad, or maybe it's just the French cooking -- (as it is truly out of this world.)

I must admit that in time I grew to treasure the music that inspired those daring, sacred chants blooming fire from centuries old masses. The words left scars of awe, fear and power as well as beauty upon these composers' minds where the hands of God speak a language of hell and heaven with human beings in between. While reading about this miraculous starstudded mass of universes that have no end but fire, one can be swept into the awesome language of the heavens that surround this life. It is through this somewhat modern, marvelous, clashing music beyond our ken, that we have an experience of falling off the world, still having faith that someone will catch us and that we have not, as yet, lost our minds. (As an aside, it's interesting to note that scientists now believe that in the very beginning there was just only ONE atom -- and it bloomed into all this!)

I eagerly looked forward to attending Karel Paukert's recent all-Messiaen organ recital at St. Paul's, a marvelous, inspired, demanding program that is now forever in my mind. It was a chance to hear many of Messiaen's works at one sitting, while admiring Paukert's talent, guts and passion to play such a handful and a footful of music. It was also wonderful to hear the Holtkamp organ so beautifully alive and able to speak the Messianic's language, regardless of delicacy of line or full range of fiery dynamics and then some. It was all a perfect match of talent, power, genius and sound.

It served to remind me of another concert where I heard Messiaen's music played by his wife and then new music by the composer himself. His wife was a perfectly trained pianist; she played everything correctly, careful to play every note, every phrase and every dynamic; it was clean to the point of being sterile. I listened, wondering why nothing was memorable - just notes tumbling over each other while her beloved was sitting by listening intently to his music.

After many, many pages, followed by the so-so applause, Olivier got up and walked to the piano. I remember his casual style clothes, especially a medium blue shirt sort of carelessly half on - and I wondered how much more of this I could take.

He began to play his music - the blue shirt began to softly sway - his face was full of light as he became attuned to the sound - his hands caressed the keys, his whole body was playing - the music sang, - the air sang - the room sang - my body began to sing colors with his music. It became another world - the stage - the hall were gone - and even after he finished, the music was still there - the air was filled with the sound of colors. It was a powerful experience and still in my mind for one never loses heaven in the soul. I don't remember anything afterwards, yet to this day I still hear his music, more powerful than ever. What an honor to hold that bit of heaven, that bit of an atom exploding into colors of life, of sound, of a quiet power of reality.

I now know that Messiaen's atoms are alive as are yours and mine and certainly Karel's, whose hands are surely part of the cosmos. We too are all in this magic planet of sounds, of colors, of light -- living in a world of music that leaves us breathless with power, while being a part of creation. As musicians we speak the language of music, of becoming future Messiaens, of creating light through music and thereby being the sun for others still in darkness. It is our ministry.

Music Scholarship Application for Organ or Choral Study

The Cleveland Chapter of the AGO is pleased to make available several scholarships up to \$500 each to encourage the study of organ or choral music. Eligible are those who study in the greater Cleveland area. These scholarships are one-time grants and are not renewable. The scholarships are to be used by May 2010 only for continuing education in organ or choral study. This covers music-related school tuition or private music lesson fees. The application must be post-marked by March 31, 2009.

After the application deadline, finalists will be contacted to schedule an audition for the Scholarship Committee. Playing two verses of a hymn and a short solo piece of your choosing will be required. A two or three manual organ or a piano will be available for the audition. Organ students of varying abilities are encouraged to apply, including beginning organ students.

Send this completed application to: AGO Scholarship Committee, c/o Carol Neff, 3750 Avondale Road, Cleveland, OH 44122. A decision will be made by May 31, 2009. Applicants will be informed by letter.

I understand the rules for this scholarship application and state that all the information I have provided the committee is truthful to the best of my ability. If awarded a scholarship, a check will be issued to the school or private lesson teacher. I understand that applying for this scholarship in no way guarantees that I will receive any funds.
