FROM THE DEAN

The Mozart Musical Masterpieces were Magnificent! The workshop and concert led by renowned conductor Robert Porco on March 22 was a huge success. This Newsletter contains a review of the concert by Ginny Roedig (this same review will be published in the TAO in the next month or two) and an editorial written by Mary Jane Skala (a participant who is Editor of the Sun Newspapers) which appeared in 22 editions of the Sun the Thursday after the concert. There were over 100 members of the community chorus and almost 400 people in the audience. The chorus had participants from more than 20 churches and the generous good-will offering will allow us to augment our scholarship funds to the tune of \$1500.

This event was a massive undertaking and two of the people working the hardest were Tim Robson, organist and Ginny Roedig, event chairperson. Other members of the Program committee who worked tirelessly included Robert Day, Michon Koch and Carmen Massaro. The Federated Church and staff were gracious hosts. Their involvement even included Hamilton Throckmorton, Sr. Minister, singing tenor and his 80 + year- old Mother from Bangor Maine, singing alto.

Judith Higbee, Joy McGuire and Ginny Roedig all held workshops in their churches to learn the music. Dr. William Foley led the dress rehearsal the day before. Don Jackson designed a marvelous poster and Jeanette Davis Ostrander helped accompany the solo auditions.

The soloists—Marian Vogel, Sandra Ross, Timothy Culver and Nikola Budimir-- were the finest in northeast Ohio. Barry Stees, Cleveland Orchestra bassoonist, played the stunning bassoon solo, Andante from Mozart's Bassoon Concerto, as an offertory.

Robert Porco was a joy to work with. As Mary Jane Skala points out in her editorial- we all got to experience his musical genius, his passion and his fervent drive for excellence. I felt especially privileged to participate since one summer I wanted to try out for the Blossom Chorus which had advertised for tenors. I was informed by phone that the Chorus did not accept female tenors, and since even a G above middle C is a strain for my voice, that is the only part I can sing. So here at last I had my chance to sing under Mr. Porco!

So Thank You, Thank You, Thank You—to all who participated or attended. I think our AGO chapter can take great pride in the fact that over 500 people took advantage of the opportunity to make the Mozart Masterpiece Concert a worthwhile and unforgettable event.

NOW, you should have already received your AGO membership renewal forms. Please let me remind you to renew your membership before May 31 to be eligible for the free ticket to the Thomas Murray concert on July 10 at Severance Hall.

Reflections with Mary Jane Skala

Lessons from a Cleveland musical genius

Thursday, March 26, 2009 Imagine Eric Wedge agreeing to coach your son's Little League Team for a day.

That's what it was like for me when Robert Porco, director of choruses for the Cleveland Orchestra, led 130 amateur singers, including me, in Mozart's "Coronation Mass" on Sunday.

I was humbled at Porco's accepting this invitation from the local chapter of the American Guild of Organists to coach us amateurs for a day. By the time it concluded, I was drunk on the wine of his knowledge, his passion and his fervent drive for excellence. If only we could infuse our lives with his gusto.

He stepped to the podium at the Chagrin Falls church for a four-hour rehearsal Sunday afternoon, but we didn't sing at first. We wiggled, twisted, rolled our shoulders, dangled our fingertips at our toes and groaned to release stress. The body is our instrument, he said. It must be loose and stress-free.

"Your chest is like a barrel. Fill it with air," he instructed. "Think of your mouth as a cathedral! The sound should soar high, up to the dome.

"Singing is north and south, not east and west. Drop your jaw. Aw. Say it: Aw. And get rid of that flat Ohio 0.'"

He joked about hearing "Kentucky Latin" when he directed the May Festival Chorus in Cincinnati before coming to Cleveland.

We knew our music because our respective choirs had rehearsed it since January, but the notes are just the clay, Porco said. Now we must make Mozart come alive.

For four hours, we stopped and started, stopped and started as Porco dissected every measure of music like a biologist in a lab. Excellence hides in the details, he said.

He told us how George Szell, the late legendary conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra, walked among the musicians as they practiced Beethoven, listening to how each one was playing staccato 16th-notes. Detail, he said.

Equally crucial, he said, is joy. "Sing! Sing with joy! Why else are you here?"

"If you sing without gusto, why should people come?" he asked after one limp go-around. "Exaggerate! Concerts are theater!"

"Attack! Don't wait for your neighbor -- sing!" He prefers loud gaffes to timid whimpers.

Then, "Sing the words! If words aren't important, we'll just let the orchestra play."

He talked about the genius of Mozart, a touring pianist at age 6 and who wrote 600 compositions in his brief 35 years. Think about Mozart's words, he said, and how Mozart put ancient text to music.

"I believe in one God!" Porco declared, translating Mozart's Latin into English. "He wrote all four parts in one unified key to make that statement: I believe in one God! Sing it like that!"

"Average isn't good enough. You want it to be your best," he urged before we broke for supper.

In a society littered with over-produced pop musicians, where Anderson Cooper passes for a journalist, where every kid gets a trophy to Scotch-Guard his self-esteem, Porco and his push for nothing but our best was exhilarating. Our culture is starved for what he has to say.

The church was full that evening when Porco raised his baton. We were weeks away from the excellence he championed, but we sang hard anyway -- then suddenly, it was over. All that work, and it was over. The next morning, though, I was still sparkling. Porco was right. Singing, especially with him, was pure joy. <u>mjskala@sunnews.com</u> or (216) 986-5470.

AGO CHORAL FESTIVAL MARCH 22ND

Cleveland, OH, March 22nd, the Cleveland chapter of AGO had the great privilege to prepare and perform Mozart's Coronation Mass under the direction of Robert Porco, Director of the Cleveland Orchestra Chorus. All chorus members of AGOaffiliated churches were invited to attend. A number of choirs prepared the works as a group: the church choirs of Church of the Savior, Cleveland Heights, director Judith Higbee, Federated Church of Chagrin Falls, director Dr. William Foley, Brecksville United Methodist Church, director Joy Fenton, and First Presbyterian Church of Willoughby, director Ginny Roedig. For those individuals who wished to participate but did not belong to one of these choirs, the directors of the above choirs offered retreat-style workshops to assist in preparation for the festival. Well over 100 singers participated.

Saturday, March 21st, a preparatory dress rehearsal was held at Federated Church in Chagrin Falls, venue for the concert. Sunday, March 22nd, 2-6p.m., Mr. Porco directed an intense preparation of the works involved. Dinner was offered at 6, the concert began at 7:30. The all-Mozart performance included the following choral works: *Laudate Dominum* from the Vesperae Solennes de Confessore, the motet *Ave Verum Corpus*, and concluded with the *Coronation Mass*. Mr. Barrick Stees of the Cleveland Orchestra contributed the second movement of Mozart's Bassoon Concerto in B-flat Major as the Offertory. Mr. Porco's rehearsal began with a number of physical exercises not seemingly related to the human voice. However, as Mr. Porco explained, we don't sing just with our vocal chords, but with the entire body. During the extensive preparation, much attention was paid to production of the correct type of sound, consistent vowels and diction. Mr. Porco interjected explanations of the background of the pieces as well as proper performance practice. His work reflected a great deal of precision as well as sensitivity to the interpretation of the music.


This concert festival was an outstanding opportunity to "encourage excellence in the performance of ... choral music" as written in the mission statement of the AGO. It offered members the rare opportunity to work under the direction of one of the nation's outstanding choral directors and become acquainted with a work outside of the repertoire of most church choirs. Mr. Porco is not only director of the Cleveland Orchestra Chorus, but was Chairman of the Choral Department of Indiana University Scholl of Music for 18 years and has appeared with numerous orchestras internationally.

In addition to Mr. Porco, the enormous success of this concert was also due to the contributions of the many talented persons who were also involved. At the organ console was AGO member Tim Robson, organist for Euclid Avenue Congregational Church, assisted during the rehearsals by Marcia Snavely, organist for Federated Church. The four excellent soloists were Marian Vogel, Soprano, Sandra Ross, Alto, Timothy Culver, Tenor, and Nikola Budimir, Bass-Baritone.

Mr. Porco and the chorus received a standing ovation from the audience in the filled sanctuary. Choir members were extremely enthusiastic to have had the opportunity to participate in this event and praised Mr. Porco both as an outstanding educator and musician. What a wonderful way to contribute to excellence in music!

WCLV and co-sponsor, The Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist, are presenting the second annual regional church choir festival culminating in the final rounds at The Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist on May 7 and 8, 2009, with live broadcasts before an audience on WCLV at 8:00 PM each evening. The host for the broadcasts will again be Lloyd Newell, the radio voice of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

The goal of this Festival is excellence in choral singing and diversity in styles. The repertoire will include not only western classical music but also the tradition of gospel and other genres. Choirs will be judged on their technical ability, their musicality and their work as an ensemble.

COUNTDOWN TO THE REGION V CONVENTION

The biennial convention of Region V of the American Guild of Organists will take place on Sunday, June 28 through Wednesday, July 1, all over the metropolitan Detroit area, and headquartered at the renowned Renaissance Center Marriott.

This is a great opportunity for organists, music directors, choir members and enthusiasts alike to share a unique professional and social experience and get inspired all over again! You will hear some great artists, such as Lynne Davis, Janette Fishell, Fred Hohman, Martin Jean, and Todd Wilson, playing great music on a variety of fine instruments--mechanical, symphonic, classic. But the convention will feature useful workshops on music for the church, choir rehearsal techniques, new music for the organ, and other professional topics that we can all use. There will also be concerts for choir, handbells, carillon, brass band and an early music group.

Registration rates are reasonable for a convention of this length and scope: \$375 (regular), \$325 (special: i.e., spouse/partner or senior), \$250 (student). After June 1, registration is \$450 (regular), \$375 (special). This includes most meals, even a closing banquet at the Renaissance Center on Wednesday evening. A bus transportation package is available for \$90 for the entire convention. There is also a single day rate of \$190 and a single day transportation rate of \$30.
