ALLELUIA CORNER

"Where children pure and happy pray to the blessed Child, where misery cries out to thee, Son of the mother mild; where charity stands watching and faith holds wide the door, the dark night wakes, the glory breaks, and Christmas comes once more." – Phillips Brooks

The time for Christmas is coming. For a growing child, one of the challenges of life is becoming aware of the mystery of "time." The dictionary also challenges adults as it reads:

TIME: "A nonspatial continuum in which events occur in apparently irreversible succession from the past to the present to the future." This involves a strong acquaintance with mathematics in every field including music, plus learning to live through hours, days, months, years and time beyond time. This all involves the steady march of school, holidays, birthdays, plus family times. When reading the works of Albert Einstein for example, one becomes aware that his whole lifetime in science is wrapped up in one word, TIME. This includes the warping of space which reacts on our bodies when traveling in space. Space travel is a long desired aim of science preparing for when the earth is no longer inhabitable. Still in its infancy, science is looking ahead several thousand years, and like Ford and his first auto, space travel will eventually unravel the problems of space travel.

Books, and now the computer in all its magic, are the added mechanical 'brains' of mankind, but will never be able to create and think around the corners anew as our bodily brains can and will do. Within outer space the world's clocks will change to cosmos time along with our universe and our prize playmate, the majestic Milky Way.

Is death the end of time for us? Is it a lonesome journey or a promotion to another time, another sphere, an unknown heaven, or, as Jesus said, to God's many mansions? We of faith dare to believe that there is life after life – and nowhere else is it more obvious when celebrating the birth of baby named Jesus. Such an event brings in new life every year for both Christian and non-Christian countries. We celebrate this mystic presence, this time of gift-giving in thanks for the gift of a newborn boy, called

Jesus. It is a belief that, along with the magic chimney and Santa's reindeer, the message of love and faith is again reborn in a shepherd's stall.

We read in the Old Testament that the Israelites were waiting a long time for the coming of the Messiah, the prophets giving the 'exact' location, the time, and that the child would be virgin-born. Also mentioned was that the sun, the moon, and the stars would show us the way to this birth place. It also includes a growing distress between nations, (what's new?), all the while being told to be patient and that redemption will come to us (Luke 21:25-28).

This birth story inspired the creation of one of the 6,500 Hymns (words) written by Charles Wesley, "Come, thou long expected Jesus" first published in 1744 in a collection of the Lord's nativity. This poet, a Welshman, was 20 years old when he wrote this hymn. The tune carrying this poem is HYFRYDOL which means "Good Cheer" and the words are wonderful – "...born to set thy people free; from our fears and sins release us, let us find our rest in thee."

Another carol, an 18th c. Latin hymn, was sung in the Catholic Church long before it was known by the Protestant Church. It became so popular that its words were translated into over 100 languages, and we now know it as "O Come All Ye Faithful." It's interesting to know that some hymns use one of the twelve names given to the new child, yet we still know about whom we sing.

To name a few: Counselor, Helper, Messiah, Judge, Rose of Sharon, Sun of Righteousness, Counselor, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace, Master, King, Saviour.

Such powerful words celebrate the birth of a new, powerful time in our sacred history, a walk into the new, challenging inner space of love for one another, inspired by one helpless, loving child come to help unite the people of this planet.

May this 'Time" be filled with Joy.
