On Friday evening, July 13, 2007, St. Martin's Episcopal Church in Chagrin Falls, OH where I am Organist-Director of Music Ministries suffered a devastating fire. It took almost two years to rebuild and recuperate from the fire. Many areas of the church were completely destroyed; the nave suffered much damage, mostly from intense heat. The smoke-filled choir room where our music was stored was a disaster. Hard-working choir members helped remove music to be stored rather than calling it a total loss.

We used many creative methods to "continue the church's song" during the ensuing weeks, months, years.... Initially, as we worshipped in a tent in the courtyard, our folks volunteered with guitars, flutes, recorders, violins, and even accordion! Everyone worked hard to keep spirits up; music is such an important part of that.

A few months after the fire, our offices were in a trailer and our church website was finally up again. I received a surprise e-mail from an Australian composer, Colin Brumby, DMus. He said simply something to the effect that he could imagine that in such a situation as ours, we would be in need of music. He included in PDF form several

compositions for me to download and photocopy with his compliments. What a blessing Colin Brumby is! He has continued to send me music appropriate to the season during the past two and half years! Mr. Brumby even composed a setting of Psalm 122, "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord," special for us to use (gratis) in our re-dedication service!

I want to say a very special thank you to Colin Brumby for his kindness, thoughtfulness, and actions following the fire. Our choir felt so encouraged that someone else cared so much! Many times we think about people in difficult situations but how many times do we take action? Thank you, Colin, for helping to energize me through this difficult time! We have enjoyed many of your compositions and we hope others will, too!

ALLELUIA CORNER

"Music is an art that, in one guise or another, permeates every human society." Yea!

Encyclopaedia Britannica, V 12, p.662

An article in the Cleveland Plain Dealer (10/2/09) printed the top twenty words that were considered to be the most beautiful in the English language. This was from a recent poll of 7,000 people in 46 countries conducted by the British Council. Out of the several hundred words sent in, eleven words were mentioned for their sound alone. But, in the end, the most chosen words were "Lullaby" and "Mother" and were not only considered to be the most beautiful, but the most often mentioned in the survey.

I still remember hearing music from my Mother who sang at church and at the opening ceremony at Severance Hall's dedication. When searching through the total list of other chosen words, I was stunned to find that the words 'music' and 'melody" were not even mentioned at all! How can one live without music? As musicians we speak, learn and make music all the time in our various jobs. Dick played jazz (trombone) in orchestras and, through him, I found a whole new sound of making music, adding that particular style into my own playing on both the piano and organ. (It's luscious!) Among the throng I'm still learning the music of Bach, Beethoven, Mozart and Gershwin plus others down the line. We speak notes using voice and instruments to sound, and, to me, such sounds are also a 'language'. That article made me realize how vital the language of music is to us.

Powerful stories of beliefs and ongoing faith shine through both music and dialogue. A wonderful example of music in action is Handel's MESSIAH. Instead of just telling the story, the text and music bloom together in using both biblical and musical languages, revealing, in vocal technicolor, the vital and various events of a powerful, historical time.

It may be that music is not only just an art, but also a varied musical "language" of its own, and we could then poll people about which musical language is the most beautiful and meaningful. But then that might fall flat just from the various choices of styles, and

leave Duke Ellington and George Gershwin isolated and swimming in their own colorful waters.

Of course music speaks various dialects depending on the many 'styles' of music and instruments one learns and digests as one sings, plays, sleeps, lives, studies and performs. It is our journey. Speaking of sleeping, when working on recitals, etc. there were times when I was performing while in a deep sleep, and Dick had to wake me up while grabbing my performing hands and feet in the middle of the night. (I hate doing that! He never complained.)

Many of us church musicians, plus, learned music on the piano, in football-geared performances, in orchestral marches, in various choirs or in full-blown orchestral concerts.

And still, to me, the simple songs, the lullabies, are the most fragile, the most beautiful, the most treasured and the most difficult!

Have a happy heart.

Book lover does her part to help:

How many people does it take to change the world?

One.

It doesn't matter how much money you have or how much time you have left or whether you're all alone. Meet Mrs. Boyd.

Evelyn Boyd has earned the right to sit around and do nothing. She's 92. She spent 33 years teaching music, most of them in the Cleveland public schools. It bothered her that some students in grade school couldn't read the words to the songs she taught.

Reading is so precious to her. She still has the first book her mother read to her, a worn copy of "The Pilgrim's Progress."

Evelyn could sit around feeling sorry for herself. She lost her husband of 58 years when Gilbert died four years ago. Her mom, Geneva, died six years ago at 107. Evelyn lost her only sibling, a brother, in November.

"I'm the last one left," she told me.

She could isolate herself as a lonely widow on a pension and cling to every dime, but she doesn't. She volunteers weekly at the Cleveland Clinic and monthly at the Society for the Blind. And she just spent another \$30 to buy a dozen books for children she will never meet.

Every time the Daedalus Books catalog arrives, she studies the synopsis of each storybook and marks off the ones the children will enjoy most. She doesn't drive, so she has the books delivered directly to the doctor. She has no idea how many she has sent. More than 500, for sure.

She learned about the Reach Out and Read program in The Plain Dealer four years ago in a story that ran on New Year's Day. It told how Dr. Robert Needlman, a pediatrician, noticed the medical center waiting room in the inner city of Boston had no

storybooks for the children to read while they waited to have their sore throats examined. The staff told him the children were stealing the books, so they stopped putting them out.

The fact that children wanted books so badly inspired Needlman to raise money to buy thousands of books to give away to every child with every checkup. Then he started recruiting volunteers to read to children in the waiting room.

That's how he and Barry Zuckerman started the national nonprofit Reach Out and Read 20 years ago. Needlman is now at MetroHealth Medical Center and teaches at Case Western Reserve University Medical School. The Cleveland chapter of Reach Out and Read is supported by doctors, colleges, hospitals, libraries and civic groups. The U.S. Department of Education gives the national nonprofit millions to serve children in thousands of clinics across the country.

He wants to see every child grow up with the chance to love books. It isn't just a book give-away program. He urges volunteers to read to the children aloud, to help coach parents on how to read to their children.

Needlman has saved all the packing slips from the boxes Evelyn has sent. He considers one a treasure. When he passes out her books, he tells the children, "It's a present from a friend of mine who is 92."

Boyd always tells him, "I wish I could give more."

He's impressed that her ancestors were illiterate slaves, that her dad moved the family from Birmingham, Ala., for the promise of a better life. "She lived out that promise and shares it with others," he said.

She makes it sound so casual: "I just think children ought to read."

"I had a good life," she said. "I thank the Lord for that. I didn't have it by myself."

It took others.

"We didn't come into this world just for ourselves," she said. "We're here to help others."
