CANDIDATE BIOGRAPHIES:

JAMES P. RIGGS serves as Minister of Music and The Arts at Plymouth Church, UCC in Shaker Heights, a position he has held since 1998. At Plymouth, he has begun an intern program to provide student organists with professional experience. He is the Artistic Director for ArtsPlymouth which received the 2004 Sunshine Award, presented by Young Audiences of Greater Cleveland, for outstanding service to the community.

He began his organ study with Robert Nelson and then studied with Edgar B. Highberger as a student in the School of Visual and Performing Arts at Seton Hill College, obtaining a Bachelor of Music degree in Sacred Music. In May 1997, Mr. Riggs graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, with a Master of Arts degree in Organ Performance as a pupil of Dr. Carol Teti. An Associate of Arts degree in Business Management was awarded from Harrisburg Area Community College in 1989.

He is a member of numerous music organizations including the American Guild of Organists (AGO) for which he has served as Sub-Dean and Dean of the Seton Hill College/Westmoreland County Chapter, a member of the Executive Board of the Pittsburgh Chapter, as Sub-Dean of the Cleveland Chapter, the Steering Committee for the 2003 Region V AGO Convention, and most recently on the Task Force updating the Cleveland Chapter Operating Procedures. He has a journal article published in The American Organist.

If elected Dean, I would like to see our chapter begin to focus our attention on two issues, in addition to great programming. First, ways we can continue to engage and support our young organists. Second, our programming and our conversations need to turn more to what we can do for the part-time church/ synagogue musician.

In addition, we need to have fun celebrating our individual accomplishments as well as our chapter

accomplishments. Finally, we owe it to those who have gone before us and to those who are coming through the ranks (no pun intended) to work together to make a difference. Historian Will Durant says it well, "study our past and be thankful for the heritage which is ours; prepare for our future with all the vision and energy we can summon." <u>**CLIFFORD HILL</u></u> is the President and Music Buyer for Cliff Hill Music Company. An expert in choral and organ literature, Mr. Hill is consulted by church musicians throughout the world. He frequently conducts choral reading sessions and has contributed to <u>www.beliefnet.com</u>, a web site devoted to religions of the world. In addition, Mr. Hill is the music director at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Berea, Ohio. He is a graduate of Westminster Choir College where he earned the Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees. He is active in the Association of Anglican Musicians and The American Guild of Organists.</u>**

RICHARD (Rick) NELSON is Professor and Head of Music Theory at the Cleveland Institute of Music, and he, along with his wife Beth, is also the Director of Music for Children and Youth at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Cleveland Heights. He received BM and MM degrees in music theory from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and a PhD in music theory from the Eastman School of Music. He studied harmony and Solfège with Nadia Boulanger, Conservatoire Americaine, Fontainebleau, France.

Before coming to CIM, Rick taught at Mercer University in Macon, GA, and at the Eastman School. His research and writing have centered mostly on theories of figured bass and fugue, and he has given numerous presentations at regional and national conferences.

Rick has served Lutheran and Episcopalian congregations in Georgia, New York, and Ohio. While a student in Cincinnati, he sang in the Christ Church choir under Searle Wright. At Christ Church in Macon, GA, he led the campaign which resulted in CB Fisk's Opus 115, and he also served as the Dean of the Macon chapter of the AGO. In his post at St. Paul's here, he leads an RSCM choral program with nearly 60 singers and plays for the 9:00 service each week. In addition to long-time membership in the AGO, he also belongs to the Association of Anglican Musicians.

JOHNATHON ROSS, an avid church musician since the age of 10, serves as Organist for the Old Stone Church in downtown Cleveland. A native of Tilden, Nebraska, he holds both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, where he studied organ with Quentin Faulkner, George Ritchie and Christopher Marks, and choral conducting with Therees Hibbard and Peter Eklund.

John has been an active AGO member since joining the student chapter at the University of Nebraska (now part of the greater Lincoln chapter) in 2002. In 2005, he was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Lincoln Chapter Executive Committee and was reelected to the Committee when his first term expired. He was co-chair of the Program Committee for the 2006 regional convention in Lincoln, during which he presented a well-attended information workshop on the Choral Public Domain Library.

John and his wife Laura are newcomers to the Cleveland area, brought here by Laura's Master's degree studies with Todd Wilson at the Cleveland Institute of Music. In addition to his work at the Old Stone Church, John is also the Interim Artistic Operations Coordinator for Apollo's Fire: The Cleveland Baroque Orchestra. John and Laura live in Cleveland Heights with their two cats, Dolce and Piccolo.

DON SHULTZABERGER accepted early retirement from LTV Steel Corporation after 40 years of service with experience in Procurement and Commodities Management. Since transferring to the Cleveland Chapter from Pittsburgh, Don has server several terms on the Executive Committee, served two years as Sub-Dean and worked on committees for the 1989 and 2003 Regional Conventions. He has attended numerous National and Regional Conventions. After serving Churches for 30 years he wanted to have most week-ends free, and to accommodate that has served as Associate Organist at Lakewood Presbyterian Church for the past 20 years. Don is ready to once again put his experience to work for the Cleveland Chapter on the Executive Committee.

LAVERT STUART - Since 1996 I am the Organist and choir accompanist for Antioch Baptist Church, in Cleveland. Also, I am the organist for First Church of Christ Scientist, Rocky River. I have past experience in the business community in musical matters. I have a degree from the New England Conservatory of Music. As Director of the Sutphen School of Music, a small community music school, instituted a three-year strategic plan with assistance from the Ohio Arts Council. Established an advisory committee to assist with fundraising and community outreach. Successfully implemented a hand bell, Orff-Schulmerk kindermusick, and an organ programs. Established an annual concert series with local and international artist, faculty and student representation. It is my desire to share my ideas and talents with the Cleveland A.G.O. and to work closely with the organization.

<u>GRANT WISWELL</u> has recently been appointed Organist, East Shore Church (United Methodist) in Euclid. He moved to the Cleveland area in the summer of 2006, retiring after 15 years in Europe teaching History and Computer Studies to American military personnel for the University of Maryland.

Alongside a prior career in the computer industry in different parts of the US, he played for church services. He was an AGO member part of that time; active in the Detroit chapter in the 1970s, serving on the Executive Committee. Grant re-joined the AGO in the Cleveland chapter in 2008.

"Dashing through the snow in a one horse open sleigh, O'er the fields we go, laughing all the way."... Old Sled Song

"Dashing through the icy-snow in an eager eighthorse Ford, O'er the roads we go, praying to the Lord. Horns on autos beep, making spirits cringe, What fear it is to drive on ice while praying for your sins." ... New Sled Song

Well, we don't usually have sleighs on the highways anymore, but we do have cars and trucks sailing by, and I, for one, do enjoy snow off the roads. Yet, wherever it is, snow is one of nature's interesting and marvelous gifts to mankind.

It is difficult for us to create snow or even count the amount of snowflakes that fall all over the earth. Such numbers would be impossible to record. Science has taught us that within each snowflake is an example of one of six varied creations of crystals, its size, and, as a solid has shapes and faces made in a countless variety of designs. No matter how or where it is made, each snowflake creates its own patterns. This includes varied size and shapes with the arrangement of the atoms determining each flake's position, pattern, and repeats of the designs in the space allotted, all within seconds of its fragile birth.

If the air is not so cold and is water laden, the snow crystals grow into large flakes, many over an inch in size. The number of complex designs is too great to count, but each flake has six points within a variety of designs and shapes – and no one knows how many patterns there are, yet perfectly designed and visible (before melting).

A snow-crystal is a solid form, each with countless variety of designs, yet all made the same. The arrangement of the atoms determines the positions and repeats of the designs, each varying in size and shape.

The basic info of the science of crystallography is one of the laws of the study of crystals. Not until 1912 a German physicist, Max von Laue, x-rayed the structure of crystals, and discovered the structure of matter which lead to the invention of the current x-ray machine.

There are 32 combinations of symmetry with crystals being classified into 32 classes and now are also further classed into 6 crystallographic systems. All this in a frozen drop of water?

Only God knows how many snowflakes are born each second and why so beautifully made. There is no number big enough to count the creation of snowflakes world-wide, yet how important snow must be to mankind and the earth. It makes one wonder if there are snowflakes on other planets in our universe, or even in heaven. I hope so.

The hand that created snow also made us, miracles of creation.

That's awesome!

The University of Michigan's Block M Records label is offering free downloads of all 270 Bach works in MP3 and high audio-quality formats at www.blockmrecords.org/bach. James Kibbie recorded the series on seven historic organs by Silbermann, Schnitger, Bielfeldt, Trost, and Hildebrandt. To date, there have been approximately half a million downloads from the site. Mr. Kibbie is Professor of Organ at the University of Michigan.

Age for application is 13-18 years. The POEA committee may choose to grant special consideration on an individual basis for admission of a potential registrant whose age or training is different than the guidelines.

All applicants to the POEA must submit a CD recording along with their application deposit of \$50.00 (once accepted, this deposit will be applied to the tuition balance). The recording (no more than 20 minutes in length) should consist of:

• an organ work by J.S. Bach

- a contrasting organ work by a different composer
- a hymn (introduction and two verses, as though accompanying a congregation)

Scholarship assistance is available through the American Guild of Organists. Please contact Paul Murray, POEA Director. In addition, students may also contact AGO chapters or their religious institutions if financial assistance is needed.

Housing will be provided at the Saint Thomas Choir School, 202 West 58th Street (between Broadway and 7th Avenue). Students will be accommodated in air-conditioned quadruple-occupancy rooms. The Choir School operates with 24-hour security.

Admission is limited to twenty (20) selected by the POEA Committee based upon their application materials. The POEA committee reserves the right to deny a student if it is felt that the student would not benefit from the advanced level of study offered in this program. All registrations are to be postmarked no later than March 15, 2010.
