FROM THE DEAN

During this next year I have invited several folks to write articles for our newsletter. Dean's Column features an article by National Vice President, John Walker. John succeeded Frederick Swann as Director of Music and Organist at Riverside Church (1983- 1992). In 1992, he became Minister of Music and Organist at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA (1992–2005). Currently he serves Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, MD and serves as Professor of Organ Performance at the Peabody Institute. Previously, he was Adjunct Professor of Organ and Sacred Music at Duquesne University (1997 – 2006), Adjunct Professor of Music at Westminster College (1993 - 1998), and Chairman of the Organ Department at the Manhattan School of Music in New York City (1984 – 1992).

My good friend and your Dean, Jim Riggs, has asked me to write a short article for publication in your chapter newsletter. Thirty-six years ago the Cleveland National Convention offered my first experience attending one of these biennial celebrations, and I still hold vivid memories of sounds and sights from that convention. I am delighted now to greet friends and colleagues in the Cleveland Chapter and to bring greetings from the National Council!

One role of the Vice President is to oversee the Guild's process of long-range planning. Last autumn the Task Force on Long-Range Planning distributed a nationwide survey to all members. We were delighted to receive more than 3,000 responses, including almost 1,200 additional comments and essays. These letters conveyed the ardent passion

and perceptive insight of Guild members throughout the nation. Our sincere gratitude to you for participating in that important survey! Members of the Task Force have recently completed analysis of all responses. Last July in Washington, DC, the Task Force delivered its documented study, including recommended actions for implementation, to the members of National Council. The results of this comprehensive report will inform and direct the focus of AGO activity during the coming months and years. One prominent and recurrent theme in the results of this survey deals with our need to nurture a more pervasive culture of hospitality throughout the A.G.O., particularly in respect to those who are employed in part-time positions and those who play digital instruments. Many respondents to the survey spoke eloquently about this topic. The two following excerpts provide a flavor of those comments:

High quality music and programming drew me to the AGO. It took years to break through the social and clique barriers with members and leadership.

I feel that my local chapter is quite 'uppity', even though I have a degree in music; not many students are welcomed, nor are part-time musicians.

Balancing these comments is this beautiful personal statement which recently appeared in the chapter newsletter of Rockford, IL, quoted here with permission of the author:

I was born and raised in Calcutta, India, and raised in the Catholic faith. I was one of a large family of musicians. My grandfather was a music teacher and my Dad was, among other things, a church organist. Dad was my music teacher and, when my legs were long enough, he introduced me to the organ. I was intimidated by the instrument at first, but fell in love with it at the same time.

After many years of playing piano and organ (pipe and B3) on a part time, mostly volunteer and sometimes semi-professional basis, my friendship with Jean and Tim Anderson (no relation) inspired me to join the Rockford Chapter of AGO.

I can honestly tell you that I was warmly welcomed by one and all, and made new friends in the organization. I did not run into a single "snob" honest! By attending meetings, concerts and events, I am falling in love again with the instrument. I am also practicing more regularly!

I continue to learn more about church music and organ with every interaction with AGO members and events, and I am delighted that all of you have extended me a sincere welcome. I look forward to a continuing musical experience and rewards with all of you in the AGO.

Results of the membership survey also cover many other topics. Guild committees have already begun to work on several of the recommendations, and the National Council will initiate a thorough discussion of this document at its meeting in October. As the Cleveland Chapter conducts its visioning process, I invite you to study the national document online and consider ways in which it might be applicable locally.

I send my personal warm wishes and greetings to the new officers and to every member of the Cleveland Chapter. The National Council and I will be listening from afar to hear the good news of welcome invitation, chapter growth, and irrepressible vitality from Cleveland!

TOM TRENNEY RECITAL ON NEWLY RESTORED E.M. SKINNER ORGAN IN PAINESVILLE

September 17, 2010, Friday evening at 7:30: Tom Trenney plays Bach, Franck, Vierne, Duruflé, Buck, Lemare, Shearing, plus an improvisation at the inaugural concert on the newly restored Skinner organ at St. James Episcopal Church, 131 North State St., Painesville, Ohio, 44077. The concert is free and open to the public, a gift to the community from THE PIPERS, which is the organ restoration committee of St. James parish. Reception follows.

THE PIPERS of St. James parish along with Bunn=Minnick Organ Company of Columbus are pleased to announce the successful completion of the restoration of Ernest M. Skinner's Opus 608, a three manual, 32 rank instrument installed in 1926 and dedicated on January 6, 1927. The organ served the parish continuously for 83 years, though incidents of water and plaster damage, and age ultimately compromised its beauty and effectiveness. Planning and fund-raising began over 15 years ago, with the physical removal beginning on June 1, 2009. After a full year of restorative work and complete set up in the Bunn=Minnick factory, the reinstallation began on June 7, 2010, and was completed by the last week The organ is now complete with the addition of a vintage Skinner harp/celesta and a Skinner 25 note chime unit with Deagan class A chimes, both rescued from other Skinner organs and discovered in the Bunn=Minnick inventory. These stops had originally been prepared for but never installed. The organ also has full MIDI capabilities. It is important to note that the physical layout and the tonal scheme have not been altered. remains a 1926 E. M. Skinner!

Three young men spent their teen years learning to play this organ and went on to Church music careers: the late David Smith, longtime Ft. Lauderdale area organist: Craig Smith (no relation to David), recently retired from the Groton School in Massachusetts; and most recently Tom Trenney, well known to Cleveland AGO members. Other Cleveland Chapter members past and present who have played this organ for services or concerts include: Paul Allen Beymer, Edwin Arthur Kraft,

Bryan Mitnaul, Tim Robson, David Gooding, Daniel Hathaway, and Todd Wilson. Other luminaries who have played this organ include: David Craighead, Sidney Nicholson, Gerre Hancock, Bruce Neswick, David Hill, Martin How, George Guest, and Philip Moore. I apologize for any omissions.

I hope you take advantage of the opportunity to see and hear this vintage instrument at the upcoming concert by Tom Trenney on September 17. I would also like to invite chapter members to an open console event, date and time yet to be determined, hopefully in October.
