ORGAN SPECTACULAR SUNDAY

In addition to the afternoon and evening events at St. Paul's on Sunday, Oct. 19, many churches are planning their own celebrations in the morning. Our August Newsletter already described what Don Jackson is doing at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Westlake, OH.

Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Cleveland Hts. Beth Lucas is preparing a bulletin insert (pamphlet) about their 1950 Hillgreen-Lane, 27 rank pipe organ, with stop list, history of the instrument and upgrades made, along with program notes about the musical selections chosen for that particular morning's worship service. She plans to play an extended prelude that morning and during the worship service will use the organ as a solo instrument, as well as combining with brass, choir and handbells for festival anthems and hymn arrangements.

The Federated Church (UCC), Chagrin Falls. There will be a mid hour service with a representative of the Schantz Organ Company who will describe and demonstrate how an organ works. Special organ music will be included as Prelude and Postlude during the two services.

Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, 50 North Prospect Street, Akron, Ohio 44304. 7:30 PM. There will be an organ recital given by Jane Parker-Smith (London, England) co-sponsored by the Akron Chapter, AGO.

Lakewood Presbyterian is celebrating the organ spectacular with special music, including one of the commissioned works, in worship. Throughout the next full year, on the third Sunday of the month, the year of the organ will be celebrated by inviting people to come to the chancel and watch the instrument being played, ask questions, or play a piece.

At Ascension Lutheran Church, North Olmsted, Organist Alan Higbee will present special service music on Ascension's 19-rank Moeller, including Bach's popular Toccatas in D minor, C major and F major, Vaughan Williams' Rhosymedre, the soprano solo from the Faure Requiem, and an original setting

of "O Waly Waly" for flute and organ.

Church of the Ascension in Lakewood will provide a special insert in the bulletin regarding the history of the instrument and its upgrades, including the most recent renovation in 2003 by Holtkamp. Special music will be presented for the Prelude and Postlude.

ALLELUIA CORNER

"No one is useless in this world who lightens the burdens of it for another." ... Charles Dickens

When reading this quote, my mind goes to those of us active in the business of working with musicians who speak the language of sound. It is a constant striving to enlighten the souls, fingers, feet, ears and bodies of students and others capable of translating this marvelous dialogue into a profound resonance. As a child when first watching others creating music, I realized that "I could do that, too!" and was fearlessly driven to enter those musical pathways. I craved learning the power and beauty in music from those who had such gifts. It became my goal to share whatever musical gifts I had to hopefully lighten the burdens of others who had ears to hear and souls to receive.

As a freshman at Mather College (CWRU), I was sternly told to perfect my piano techniques and music theory classes before even thinking about the organ, so I sneaked into the empty College Chapel and turned on the old pipe organ to try it out. The battering noise of the instrument gearing up was so intense, I immediately turned it off, thinking I had killed it. With heart pounding, I dared to turn it on again and, after it and I both calmed down, began to explore all that the organ could do. It then became a daily exercise to dance around on this century old pipe monstrosity. To my amazement, people started coming in to study while I was playing. Others, thinking I could really play the organ, asked me to play hymns for various Mather meetings, etc. Several girls asked if I would play for their wedding ceremonies in the Chapel, and, as I was full of empty pockets, I happily accepted the challenge.

Slightly chagrined, the music department head then told me I could study organ the following semester and I began to 'really' learn all about the organ at Church of the Covenant. The organ there was a beautiful instrument that did not wheeze, sneeze, screech, skip, waver or die as it was turned off, on,

or played upon. My wonderful teacher lightened my heavily burdened talent and time with patience, faith, knowledge and encouragement. From him, I learned how to create a musical sound on a rigid and unyielding instrument full of air. I also discovered that hymns were to be played with the right hand on the G clef, the left hand on the tenor and the FEET (both of them, alas!) on the bass. (I'm also now on my toes a la Bach as some of the organs of the time did have short pedals.) I discover over again that the more I learn, the less I know, but still happily continue to study, even breaking the 'rules' when necessary (as most of us do) while learning, playing and researching my craft. It's a world that never ends, and I only hope there are instruments and music in heaven. (If not I'm staying here.)

I must say that each of my many teachers were marvelous in giving me 'light,' illuminating those many dark paths in my musical, working and living world. There are many of us also serving in such a manner, passing on methods and creative ideas to future generations. While continuing to study/play both the piano and organ, I realize how eternally grateful I am for my teachers and family (especially husband, Dick) who supported me beyond measure in my forever search for music's message to the soul. I pray daily that when I die I'll fall into his arms, and be able to say thanks and then... "what's up in the churches here, etc., and where in heaven is the AGO located?" ...and I expect an answer.
